On behalf of all the men and women of the South Haven Area Emergency Services (SHAES), it is my pleasure to submit our 2021 Annual Report. Our department is filled with dedicated men and women who are committed to enhancing community safety and quality of life in the South Haven area.

This report cannot possibly capture all of their individual efforts, but does represent an overview of their collective accomplishments. Our purpose is to minimize pain and suffering in our community and we achieve this goal through high-quality professional services such as fire suppression, fire prevention, advanced life support ambulance transport service, confined space rescue, dive and ice rescue and fire inspection programs.

Listed below are a few highlights and accomplishments we achieved over the past year. Mostly notably, SHAES' 25-year anniversary!

- Eighteen new VHF/800 MHz radios purchased to improve communications.
- SHAES purchased additional water safety equipment. Aqua-Eye underwater sonar device, additional life jackets, training for DNR boater certification. All with generous donations from our community.
- Matthew Dey was awarded SHAES' Firefighter of the Year.
- New Squad 2 purchased, awaiting delivery.
- SHAES' FF/Paramedic Johanna Quinn and ACSO Jacob Gage were presented Life Saving Awards.
- New Lucas Device purchased (mechanical CPR).
- Amanda Quinn promoted to FF/Paramedic.
- SHAES implemented its first Cadet Program.
- Seven new certified instructors were added to the roster.
- SHAES took delivery on our new Rescue 1.
- Our department went national with Tom Renner's article featuring the history of SHAES' Yosemite Sam.
- SHAES' Dive Team had an increase of six new members.
- Training and accountability improved.
- Phil Poole, Jacob Clemons, Kevin Wildey promoted to FF/EMT-B.
- Five new Paid On Call members added to the roster: Jazmin Cortez, Jordan Walthall, Levi Warren, David Freislinger, Maggie Murillo.
- Murals were added to T-8 and L-1 in memory of deceased department members David Henry, Stanley Wakild, Edward Bierhalter and Edward Bierhalter's wife Dorothy.
- SHAES responded to a total of 2,592 incidents in 2021. An increase of 234 calls for service.






## 2021 Training

SHAES members logged 3,800 training hours in 2021. A very sizeable number considering our ever-increasing call volume.




### Medical Response by District




■ Casco Twp ■ Geneva Twp ■ SH City ■ SH Twp ■ Mutual Aid




SHAES has always, and will always, take an active part in community events. 2021 was no exception. Here are a few examples of us giving back to the communities we serve that support us every step of the way!






## Around the Station


## On the Call

SHAES had a record number of incidents in 2021. Even with all the curveballs 2021 had thrown, our extremely dedicated staff kept our community safe. It takes a special person to get respond at 3AM...and do a good job. We are fortunate to have a roster of twenty-five Paid on Call, sixteen Career and six Life Members to pull the load. From being dispatched on duty to the fourth call of the night, to leaving Christmas dinner with the family, the alarms do not take a day off. Our members can not enjoy a true day off. Even when out of town, the responsibility and want to serve is still present. I commend all of our members for their dedication, service and will to serve the communities we protect.



2021 was the busiest year in SHAES' 25-year history. Along with a 9% increase in alarms, our staff also dealt with the challenges of Covid, staffing shortages, equipment failures but all of our members contributed, finishing out the year a huge success. 2022 is proving to be another busy year but I'm confident that with our dedicated staff, support from our Authority Board and continued backing from our community we will submit our next annual report with success stories and pictures to share as we have the last 25 years.

## 2021 Water Safety

With the increase in water rescue response and drownings occurring in 2020, SHAES members in partnership with South Haven City, began a new water safety initiative. At the core of this initiative was education. SHAES and SH City provided our residents and visitors with a better knowledge of our flag system, the dangers of Lake Michigan, and more options to get notified of changes and the various methods to receive this information.

2021 SHAES responded to three total water rescue calls, none which required rescue. This effort put forth by SHAES members managing the program intensely, diligence in informing the public of changes and of course our beach flag attendants, truly made a difference. Funds from the support of our community through fund raisers and private grants allowed us to purchase additional tools to prevent drownings and assist with rescue efforts when needed.

## SHAES 25-Year Anniversary

January 1, 1996 a joint fire and ambulance service authority was formed under the name of South Haven Area Emergency Services. While authorities were not a new concept, the undertaking of such a project in our area was daunting but the members responsible for incepting SHAES were confident that this was the best way to provide quality fire and medical services in the changing times.

Twenty-five years later SHAES operates out of three stations, providing coverage to Casco Township, Geneva Township, South Haven City and South Haven Township. ALS transport ambulance service, fire protection and rescue are only a few services provided. 15,000 year round residents over the span of nearly 100 sq. miles rely on SHAES' professional services. This commitment was made twenty-five years ago and is as strong, or stronger, than it was in 1996. SHAES' founding members were absolutely correct in their belief that this organization would blossom into a proud association of men and women willing to do what is necessary to provide only the best services to the communities we protect.
